What is the story about?


It's Pancake Day and Miss Drake's class are making pancakes at school. The Headteacher tells them an important visitor is coming to see the class. Unfortunately, pancakes are tossed onto the floor, one falls in the bin and one gets stuck on the ceiling. The classroom quickly becomes a mess, just as the visitor is arriving. Lola and Asha keep the visitor busy at the door while the other children clean up the classroom. While the visitor is admiring the tidy room, the pancake on the ceiling falls onto her hat, but luckily, she doesn't notice.

Talk together

Look at the cover and read the title together. Talk about the cover illustration, and ask your child what they think the story will be about. Look briefly through the book, and talk about what is happening in the illustrations.

Read the story

- Encourage your child to read the story aloud to you, and join in with the enjoyment of the story.
- If your child misreads words, ask him/her to reread the sentence and check it makes sense, but don't let your child struggle for long or he/she may lose the sense of the story.
- If your child has difficulty with some words, e.g. 'careful' (page 3), help him/her break the words into smaller chunks and then fit them back together, e.g. care-ful.
- On page 21, ask your child what has fallen on the visitor's hat.
- Ask your child to say what he/she enjoyed about this story, and encourage him/her to read it again.



Ben stirred the batter faster.


Some batter flew out of the bowl. It landed SPLAT on Harry's head.




"Stop it!" said Harry.

It was time to toss the pancakes. The children wanted to have a go.





The pancake landed SPLAT on the teacher's desk. Then it slid into the bin.

"Never mind," said Miss Drake. "You can have another go later."






The pancake flew up into the air but it didn't come down. The children looked up. The pancake was stuck on the ceiling! This time, Ben, Asha and Lola laughed.

"What a lot of pancakes," said the Headteacher.




"What a tidy classroom," said the visitor.

Play a game

I spy

This game will help your child recognise words within words, which will help him/her to spell independently.

- Play a game of I Spy, looking for words within longer words.
 Say to your child, "I spy 'pan' in a long word." Ask him/her to find and read the word. (pancake)
- Ask your child to take a turn with another word.
- Look through the pages and repeat with other compound words. (pan/cake, head/teacher, class/room, to/day, an/other, some/thing, any/thing, head/ache)

Other ideas

- Write the words from your I Spy game onto separate pieces of paper, mix them up, and make new invented words by joining them together again.
- Ask your child to describe what happened in the story using words such as first, next, then, at last.
