

**THE PROJECT:**

American director Michal Goldman moved to Cairo in 1992 for a year-long stay. Even more striking to her than the colorful look of the city was its rich mixture of sounds. The clatter of donkey carts, the roar of construction equipment, blaring car horns, the constant chatter of human voices, and street music filled her ears. After a while she began to recognize the omnipresent voice of Umm Kulthum on daily radio broadcasts and in the city's cafes, shops and taxis. The singer had died in 1975, yet people from all walks of life spoke of her as if she was still alive. To Goldman, Umm Kulthum's music and story seemed to be an important thread running through Egypt's modern history. It was then that the director decided to create a film about Egypt and Umm Kulthum.

Goldman was aided in her research by a fortuitous encounter with Virginia Danielson, an American musicologist who was in Cairo writing a scholarly book about Umm Kulthum. Able to read all of the available Arabic sources on the famed singer, Danielson opened up the nuances of the subject to Goldman. The director spent an entire year collecting archival materials and writing, then filmed and edited over the next year. She worked with Misr International Films in Cairo, a production company formed by Egypt's renowned director Youssef Chahine. She also worked with cinematographer Kamal Abd Al-Aziz, who has worked with Egypt's new generation of directors, including Mohamed Khan. For Umm Kulthum, A Voice Like Egypt, Abd Al-Aziz managed to combine the visual languages of documentary and dramatic cinema. The film was shot on video and 16mm film and was shown in theaters in the USA and on a number of public broadcasting channels across the country and abroad.

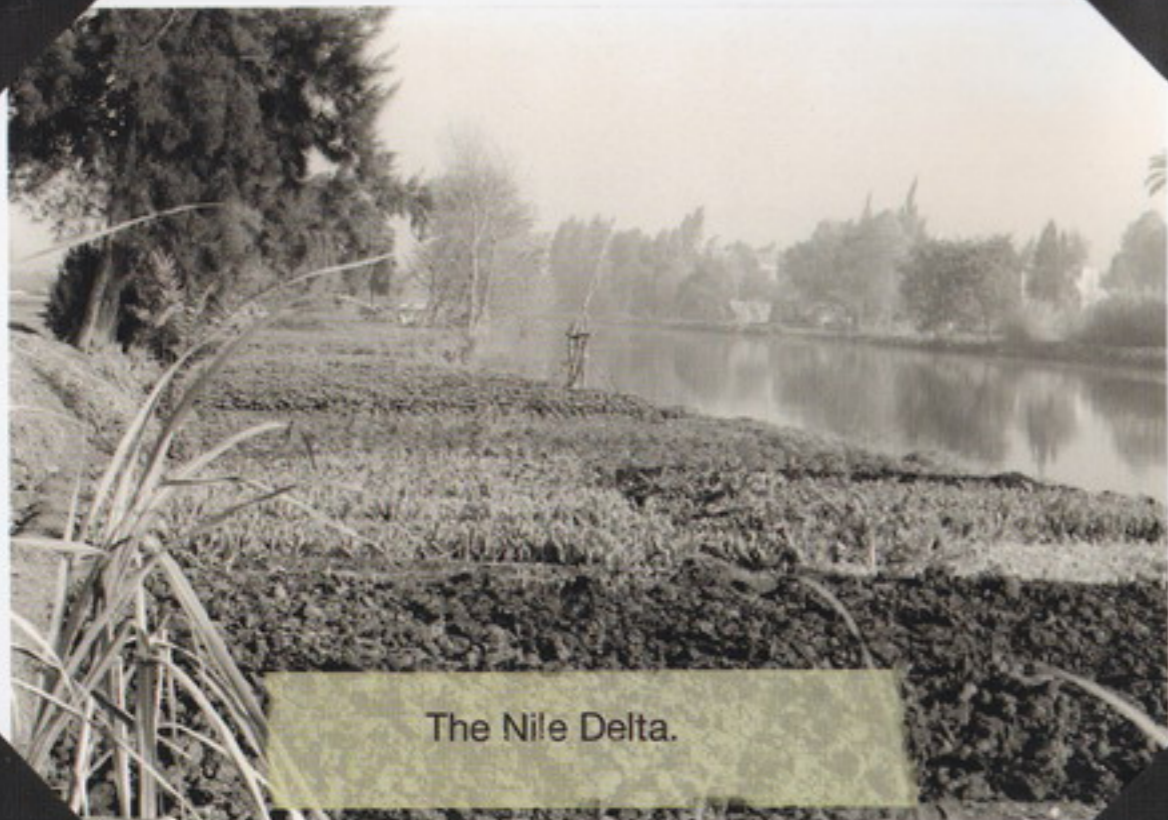

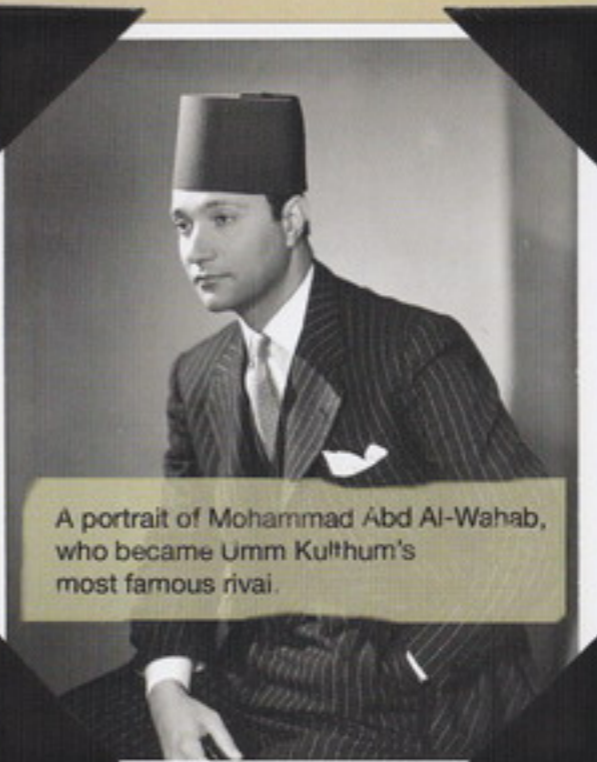
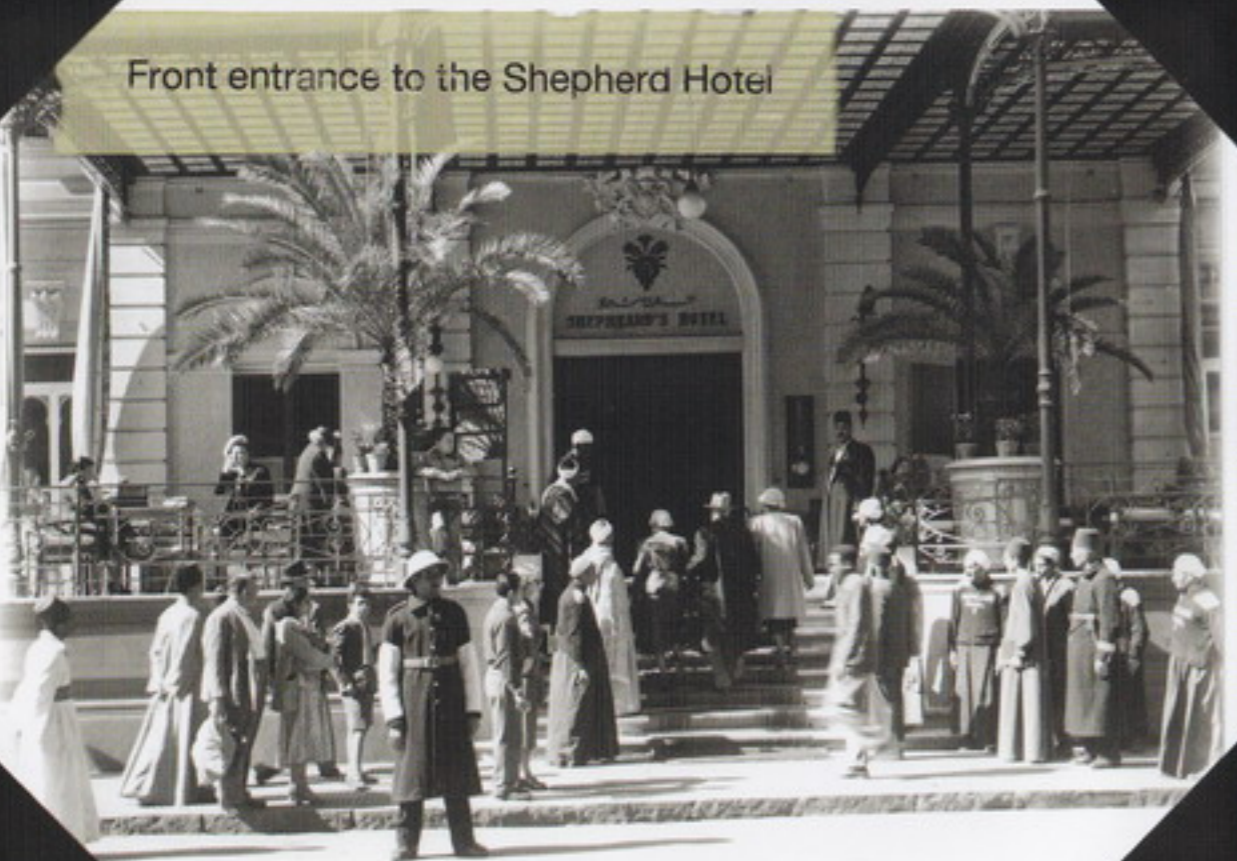

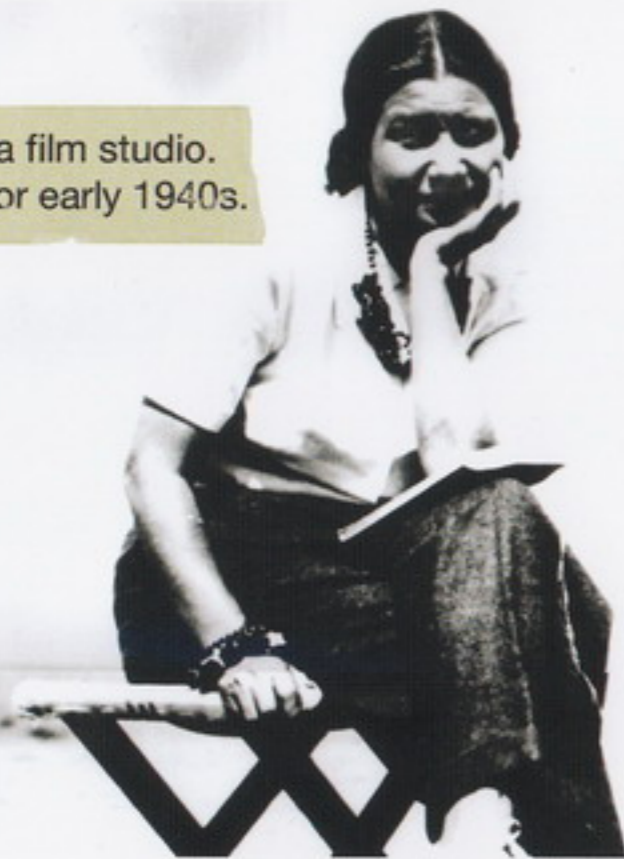

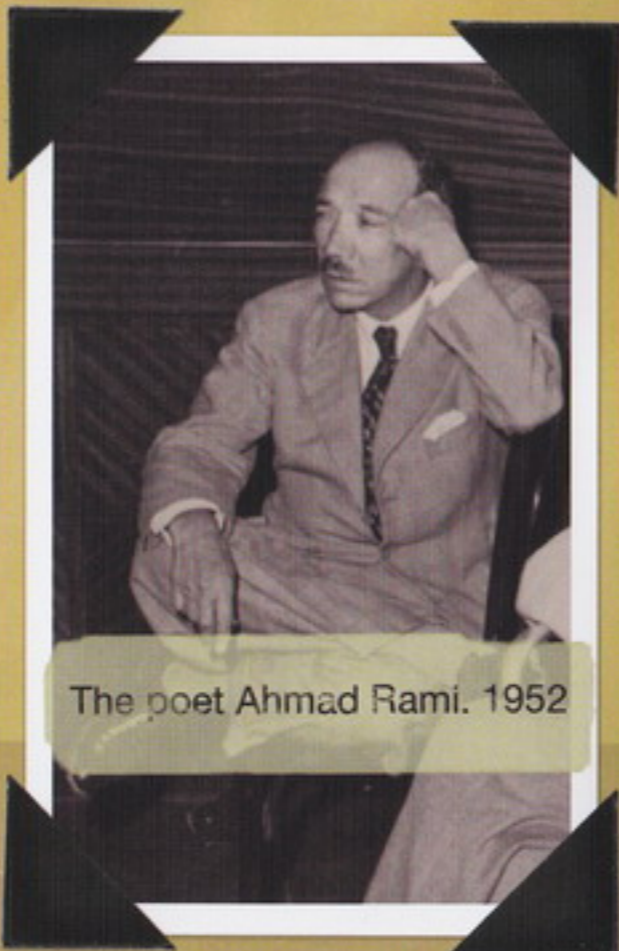

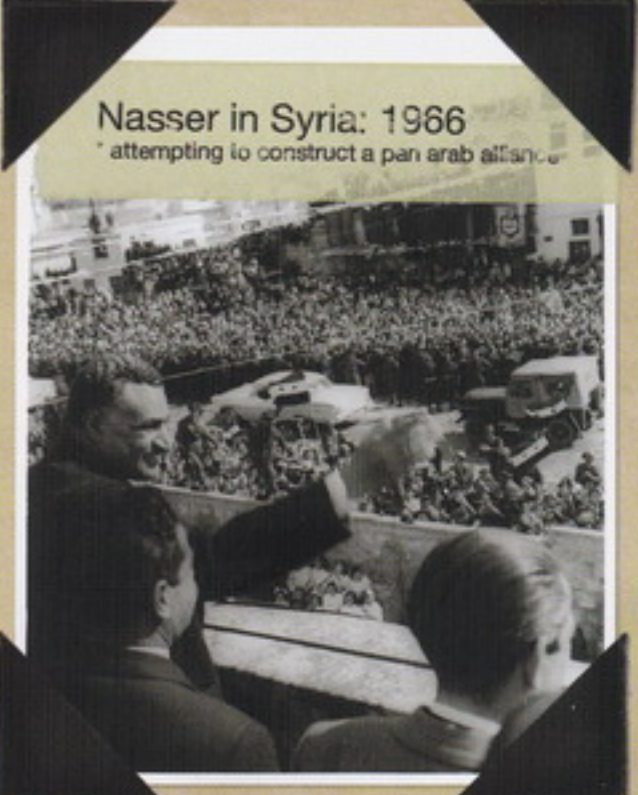

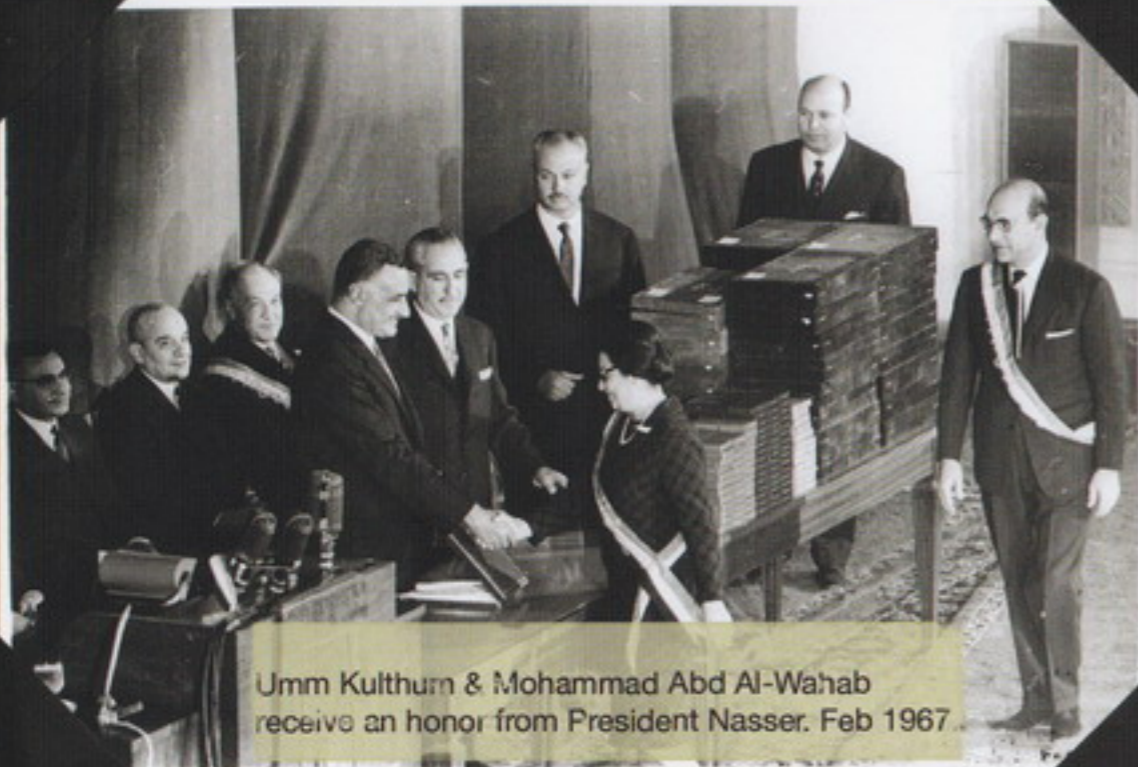

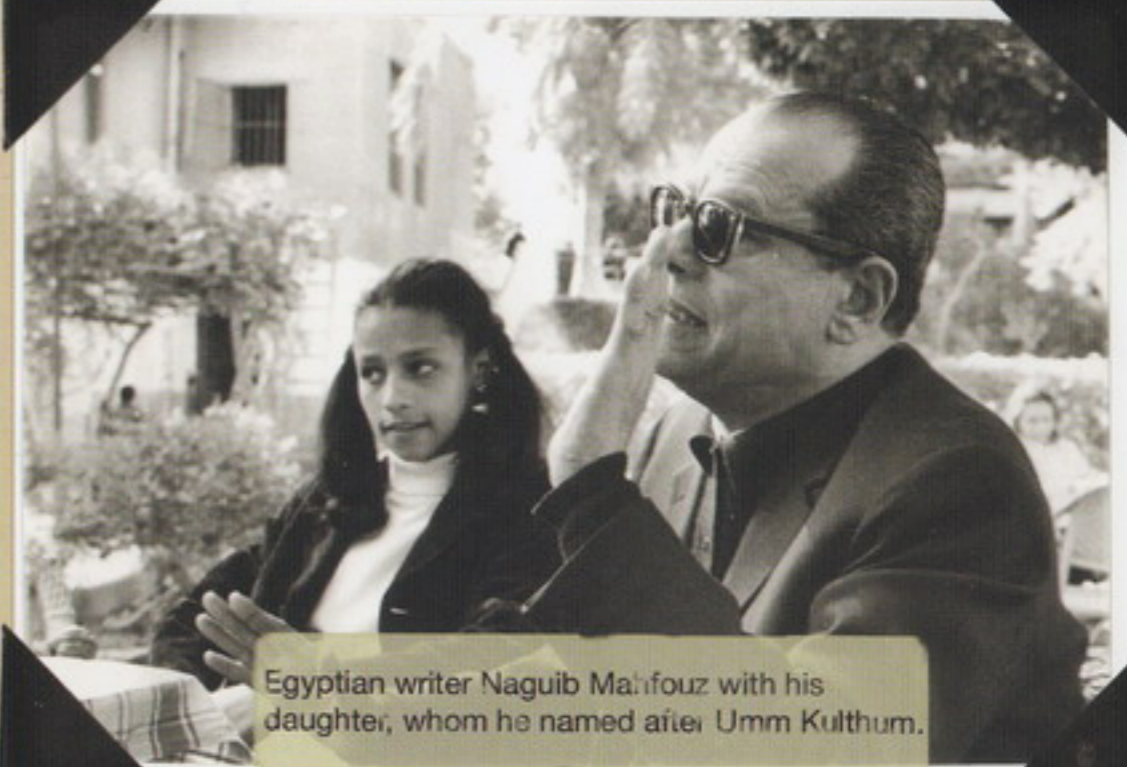

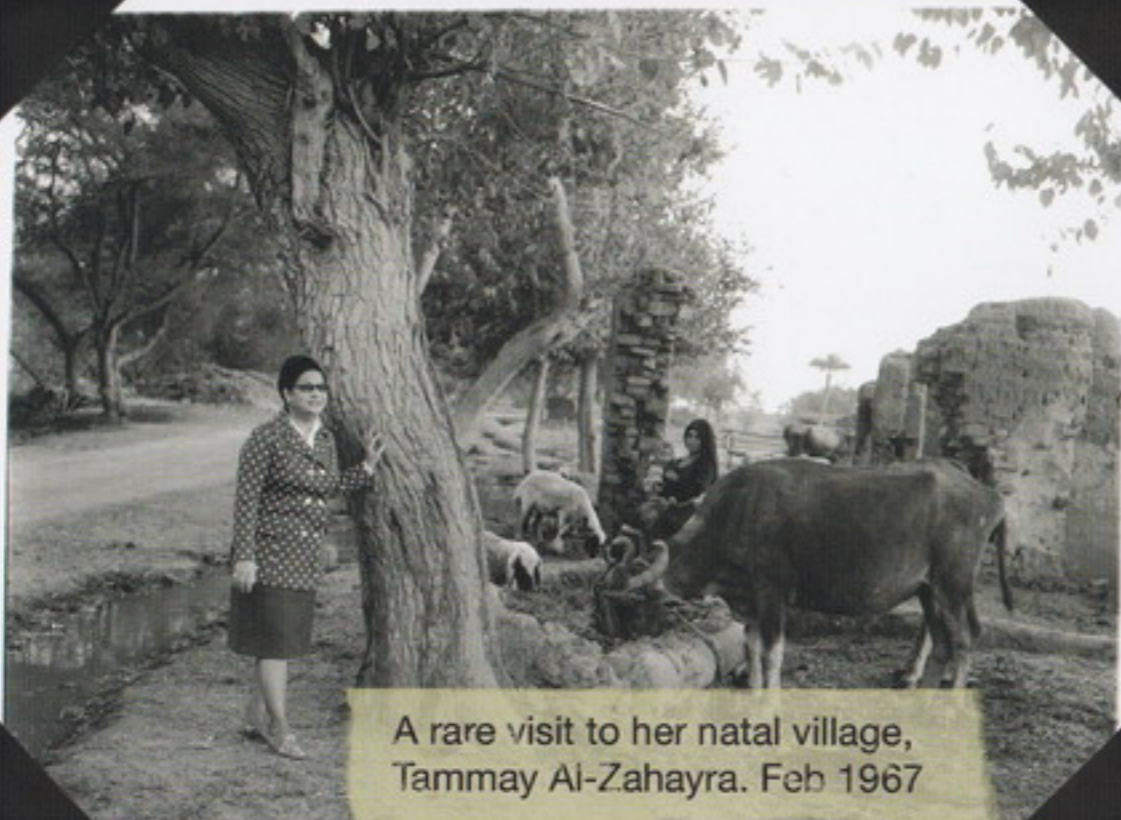

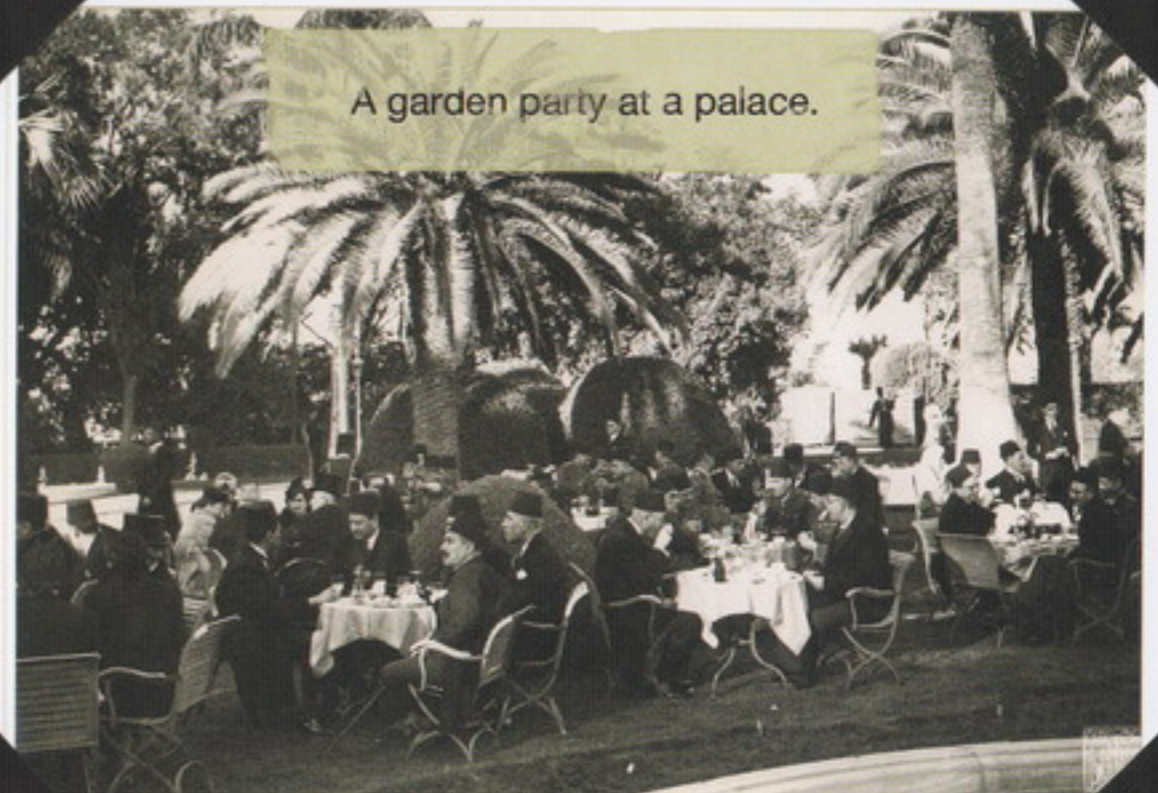

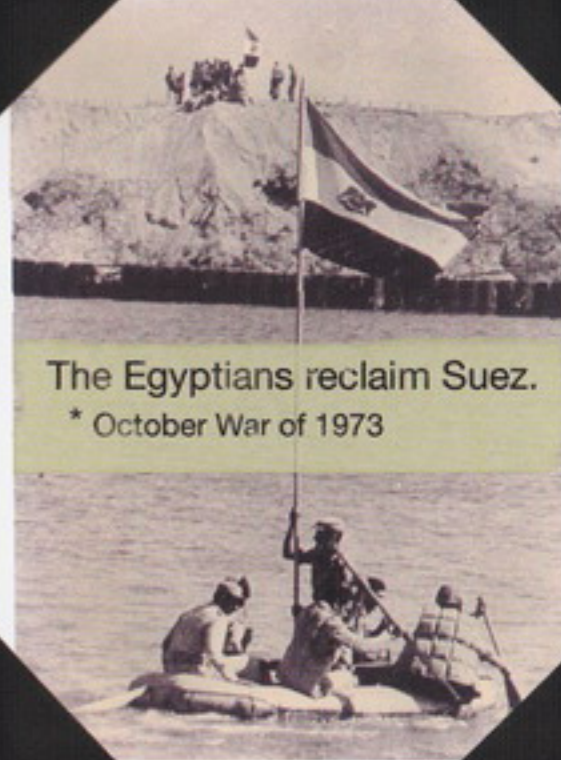
